



President's Message

Welcome to the summer edition of Behavioral Developments. With the switch to the electronic format we have more editions of the newsletter (and shorter messages from the president!). I hope you are rested and ready for a busy fall, highlighted by the SDBP 2012 Annual Meeting in Phoenix.

Our Society continues its efforts in "supporting interdisciplinary professionals to advance the field of developmental and behavioral pediatrics." Our new strategic plan will receive final Board approval at the September meeting. It focuses our work on three specific goals, to: ensure the continued success of the field of developmental-behavioral pediatrics; support life-long learning through synthesis, translation and dissemination of evidence-based DBP; and promote high quality developmental-behavioral research. These goals will be achieved through the efforts of our Committees and Special Interest Groups (SIGS) whose accomplishments will be showcased at our Annual Meeting.

I hope your plans are finalized for Phoenix. If you have not done so yet, it is not too late to register for this stellar meeting that has something for everyone. Workshops will focus on teaching DB Pediatrics; considering culture in autism screening, diagnosis and treatment; planning and executing a quality improvement project; addressing the business side of DBP; preparing for the changes precipitated by DSM-5; bridging the gap between the medical and educational worlds; and incorporating systems principles into family-focused pediatrics practice. High quality scientific sessions will address hot topics such as bullying; maternal depression and parental stress; treatment and outcomes in ADHD; developmental screening; and functional outcomes in the face of chronic illness. The Program Committee is sensitive to the issues around Arizona's restrictive immigration laws, and has planned activities at the meeting that respond to these concerns including a two part Legislative Advocacy concurrent session featuring local leaders in immigration and disability rights, and a poster symposium focused on diversity.

Our guest lecturer is Dr. Sally Ozonoff, Professor in Residence and Vice Chair for Research in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at the UC Davis MIND Institute. Dr. Ozonoff's research spans the study of the onset of autism in high-risk infants from birth through age 3 and the risk factors, both biological and behavioral, for autistic regression. Her other research projects include a twin study of autism, an efficacy study of an attention training program for autism, and a study of pragmatic language problems in autism. Dr. Ozonoff has co-authored more than 50 publications, written two books, and contributed many book chapters to her field. She is a highly sought-after speaker and her presentation is titled, "Diagnosing Autism in Infancy: When, How, and Why?"

My goals over the past year have included efforts to grow our interdisciplinary collaboration and to engage a greater number of our members (especially those who are new to the Society) in the work of SDBP. The Annual Meeting provides many opportunities for our members to become more directly involved. You will read descriptions of our committees and SIGS, and their activities elsewhere in this newsletter, and they will all be meeting as part of the program in Phoenix. Please make an effort to join those that align with your interests and talents. As I have stated before, these are critical times for our specialty and we need to do much more than just gather once a year to discuss our needs. If you cannot make it to the meeting you can still become more involved in the work of committees (they all have regular teleconferences) and share your opinions and wisdom on our Discussion Board. We want you to feel that this is your professional home and you are a part of the family. I look forward to seeing many of you in Phoenix soon. Safe travels!

Upcoming Committee Meeting




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Early Childhood Education SIG

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
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2012 Annual Meeting Highlights

In addition to being busy reviewing submissions and putting together the meeting, the program committee wanted to highlight three important issues for the upcoming meeting:


1. Program book changes: We surveyed members as part of the meeting evaluation last year on how best to provide attendees with meeting content handouts and slides. 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BI-PED: Online Support for DBPeds

The Emotional Health Committee of the AAP, Maryland Chapter has launched BI-PED (Brief Interventions in Mental Health for Pediatric Practitioners) to provide DBPeds support to pediatric providers. Housed on the AAP, Maryland Chapter website, BIPED consists of multiple modules of brief evidence-based mental health interventions design for primary care practitioners. Topics include discipline, behavior modification, family communication problems, sleep problems, habit disorders, enuresis and encopresis, as well as strategies for dealing with ADHD, depression and anxiety. There is a template for conducting a comprehensive behavioral evaluation and a review of the D-TECKT, a mental health tool to help clinicians organize their thinking after taking a behavioral history. Materials on motivational interviewing, billing for mental health services and integrating behavioral interventions into practice are included. Modules on early identification of autism and communication skills for practitioners are under development. Links to mental health screening tools are also provided, and Audio tapes of the modules linked to Power Points are available on-line.

The materials are also being used to teach pediatric residents in several Maryland based training programs. There is also information and for parents seeking information about mental health issues.

The committee consists of professionals from the fields of DBPeds, general pediatrics and psychology. Linda Grossman, MD, is a member of the committee. Committee members include faculty from the University of Maryland and Johns Hopkins Medical Centers as well as practitioners in community primary care.

New American Academy of Pediatrics Section on LGBT Issues



Health disparities, persistent stigma, and legal complexities continue to create profound difficulties for children with gender-variant behaviors and interests; gay, lesbian and transgender adolescents; and children whose parents are lesbian, gay, or transgender. Important changes in social attitudes have ameliorated but not eliminated the challenges faced by gay, lesbian and transgender physicians. These concerns have received little attention among mainstream pediatric organizations.

Members of the American Academy of Pediatrics are considering the formation of a Section to focus on lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender health issues. The goals of the provisional Section include informing the Academy on best practices for our LGBT patients and families based on current literature, Institute of Medicine findings, Joint Commission guidelines and other professional resources. The Section will also serve as a source of mentoring and support for LGBT students, residents and physicians. The Section will be open to any interested and supportive AAP member.

One of the AAP's requirements for the formation of a new Section is an assessment of the level of interest among AAP members regarding the proposed new Section. Therefore, please contact me if you might be interested in becoming a member of this Section.

There will be a planning meeting at the annual AAP NCE meeting in New Orleans in October. Please let me know (eperrin@tuftsmedicalcenter.org) if you have any suggestions as these early discussions begin.

Temperament in Practice, Now in Print

Child Behavioral Assessment & Management in Primary Care: Theory & Practice. Carey WB, McDevitt SC. Published in 2012 by B-DI, Scottsdale AZ

New this year, this 67-page manual offers an improved way for pediatricians to deal with the full range of behavior of their patients. Our book takes issue with the limited point of view now espoused by many, that the pediatrician's job is to screen with some sort of questionnaire for problems sufficiently severe to require a referral to psychiatrists or other mental health experts. Finding such problems is important, but it does nothing for understanding and helping the great majority (perhaps 90%) of parental concerns about behavior which may need our attention but do not require referral. We've designed this book to provide useful information on the fly, with helpful tables to facilitate the evaluation of the broad scope of variations of temperament and adjustment.

"This book, written by two clinicians who have worked for many years in primary care, suggests that health care professionals should view children's behavior as a spectrum in which normal conflicts shade into problems and then disordered behavior, rather than making a categorical judgment about whether the symptoms presented are severe enough to diagnose and treat as an abnormal condition."
