

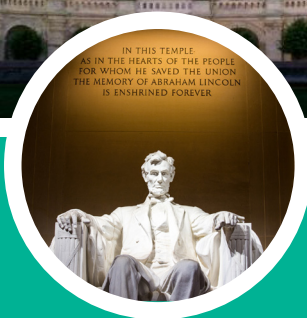

Who Should Attend

This program is planned to meet the needs of pediatricians (researchers, teachers, and/or clinicians), pediatric psychologists, nurses, social workers and other healthcare providers and researchers interested in developmental and behavioral pediatrics. PSYCHOPHARMACOLOGY FOR CHILDREN AND ADOLESCENTS WITH DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITY: PRESCRIBE MEDICATION WITHOUT FRUSTRATION

This comprehensive course will improve participants' skills in prescribing the range of psychopharmacologic agents to pediatric and adolescent patients through a developmental lens. From the most novice to the most experienced clinicians, learners will leave with enhanced skills in every step of the prescribing process: working with families, choosing a medication, titration up and down, recognizing co-morbidity, monitoring, and management. Learning will take place through case-based approaches and hands-on activities, using both shared-decision making and whole-person frameworks. Team activities will be interspersed. Topics covered include ADHD and Complex ADHD (tics, depression, anxiety), Autism, Intellectual Disabilities and Genetic Disorders, Monitoring tools, Collaborating with Families, and Resources for Families. Learners will leave with greater proficiency in prescribing and specific tools to support best care.

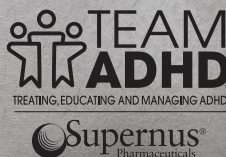

Attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) is rarely "pure." It's often the tip of the iceberg, with up to 75% of children and adolescents struggling with at least 1 other comorbid psychiatric disorder, and 60% with multiple comorbidities.^{1,3} On the high end of the range, the numbers are staggering and may be underdiagnosed: depression is reported in up to 50% of pediatric ADHD patients, as is anxiety disorder^{4,5}; conduct/oppositional defiant disorders are reported in up to 60%; pervasive developmental disorders/Autism spectrum disorder in up to 50%; learning and language disorders in up to 46%; substance use disorder in up to 22%; tic disorders/Tourette syndrome in up to 30%; and bipolar disorder in up to 22%.⁴ At a time when mental health disorders are increasingly being diagnosed,⁷ it's important to focus attention on all ADHD treatment complexities.

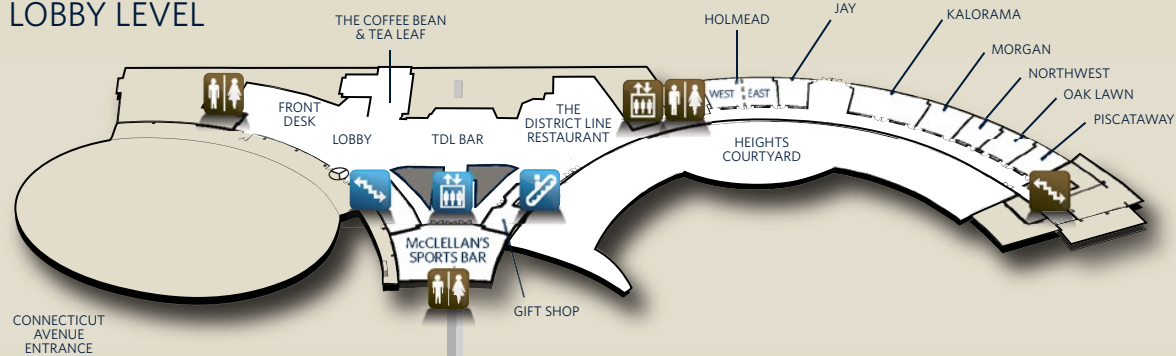
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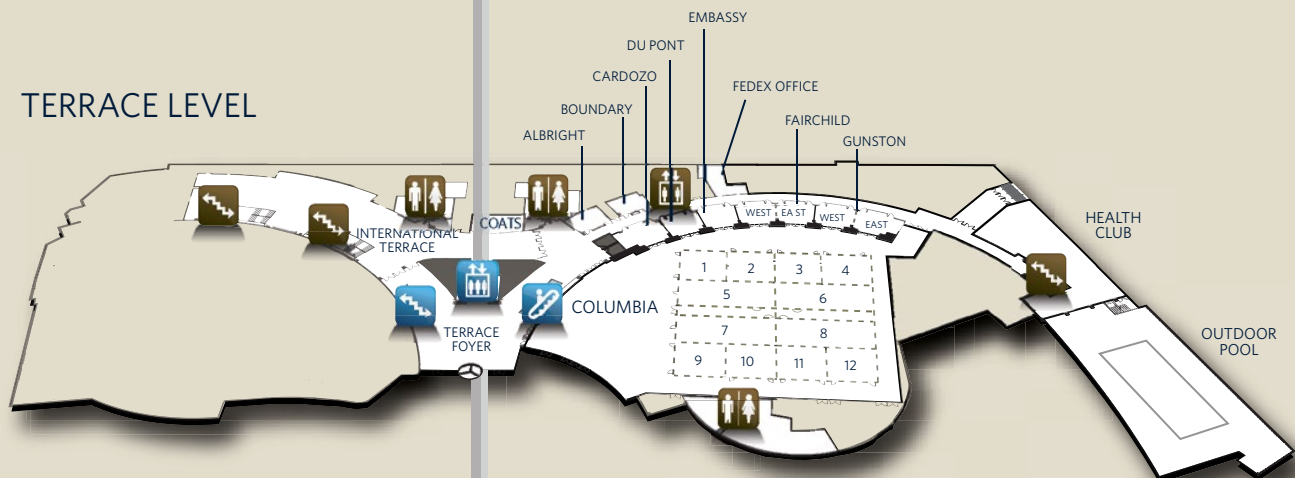
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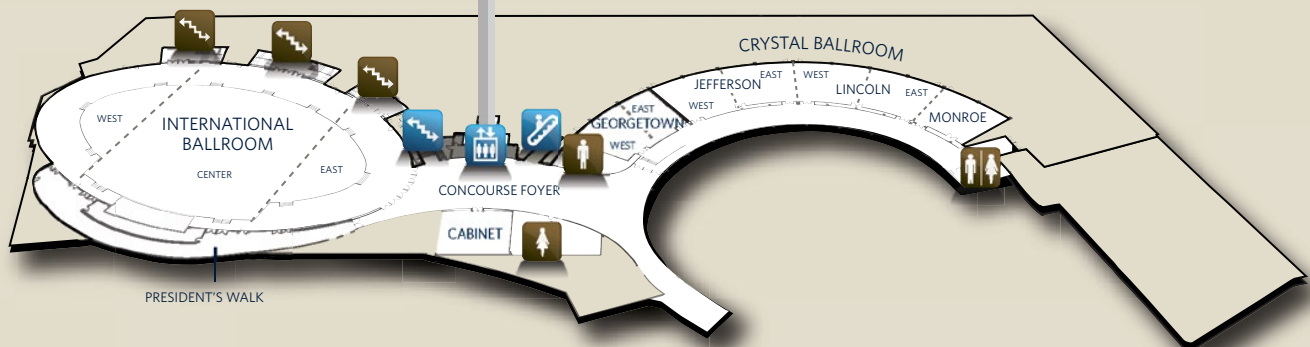

1. Download the native app from the App Store or the Google Play store. Search “**SDBP Meetings**” — then download and install. Now tap the SDBP icon on your device to open. Login using your email address.



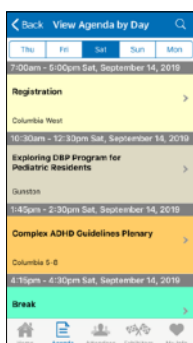

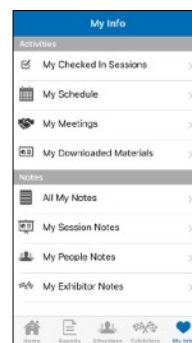
View Agenda by Day and Hour



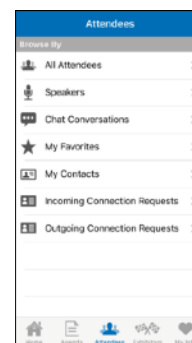

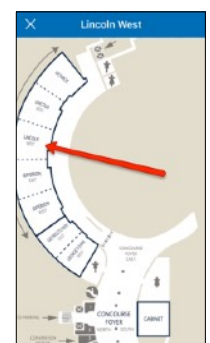
